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Metrocare Hosts Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony for new Mental Health & Disability Innovation Center

September 26, 2025 (Dallas, TX) – Metrocare marked a historic milestone yesterday with the official ribbon-cutting ceremony of its new Mental Health & Disability Innovation Center at the Hillside Campus in southern Dallas. The event brought together community partners, philanthropic leaders, and elected officials to celebrate the beginning of a new chapter for mental health and disability services in North Texas.


The newly opened campus designed by Kirksey Architecture and built by Whiting-Turner includes:

- A 45,000-square-foot Mental Health and Intellectual & Developmental Disabilities clinic, designed to serve children, teens, and adults, allowing Metrocare to expand its capacity to serve by 23%
- A 93,000-square-foot Client Services Building, housing critical infrastructure, including our Altshuler Center for Education and Research—the premier training and research center in North Texas for mental health professionals
- Purposeful community-oriented, inclusive and restoring elements including therapeutic outdoor spaces and tranquility gardens.

"This is more than a building. It's a promise to every person in Dallas County that mental health and disability care is here, and that everyone is worthy and deserving of compassionate care," said Dr. John Burruss, Metrocare CEO. "This state-of-the-art campus will deliberately offer our community a dignified place that fosters healing, a place that reflects Dallas as a National leader."

The Hillside Campus was made possible by extraordinary community support. Metrocare recognized the commitment of foundational partners including Parkland Health, which provided \$50 million in essential financing for the facility, and Dallas County, whose \$9.2 million ARPA grant provided critical funding for the new clinic.

Beyond public partnerships, the success of Hillside reflects the generosity of North Texas philanthropy. Metrocare's Capital Campaign was supported by more than 300 donors, including major gifts from The
